Who's Buying Gas in Harrisonville? — As we look at the financial impact Harrisonville experiences from those who live outside of our community, we want to take a deeper dive into something that the people of Harrisonville have said for generations –

"Harrisonville gas is the cheapest in the KC area".

While this statement is fun to brag about, and while we all believe it is true; our staff did some digging and found that there are thousands of others living outside of Harrisonville who agree!

Staff were able to break down the number of visits, the number of individual visitors and what routes people



travel to get here. The numbers might surprise you.

When staff did their break down, we looked at only five of the gas stations in our community. Staff looked at the past

year's visits to QuikTrip, Love's and the three Casey's stations. Staff found that in the past year, these five stations combined have seen approximately 2.6 million visits; and found that these visits were made by 726,000 individual visitors. That is a lot more than the 10,000 people who live inside the city limits of Harrisonville.

When you break those numbers down and look closer at who is actually buying gas (instead of just popping inside for a drink or a slice of pizza) there were 695,000 visits to these five stations by 44,500 visitors; only 6.1-percent of those visitors live inside the 64701-zip code. This means that about 94-percent of the gas purchased in Harrisonville is bought by those who do not live in our community.

Staff also found that a majority of these visitors come from communities north of Harrisonville, as data showed a majority of customers traveled south using Interstate 49 and Missouri-291 Highway, while a smaller number travelled north on I-49 or used

Missouri 7 or 2 Highways. These numbers both reflect the size of the communities in each direction but also show that many people who live in larger communities like Belton, Lees Summit or Raymore are willing to come to Harrisonville to get gas - even though a majority of their day-to-day lives may not happen here. Of the stations we looked at, QuikTrip and the Casey's truck stop were visited the most. Fun Fact: Did you know the Casey's truck stop in Harrisonville is the 13th most visited Casey's location in Missouri and the 41st most visited in the entire United States? That's pretty impressive for a town of 10,000. So what does all of this mean? As we had learned in past newsletters, we know that a majority of the Harrisonville general fund is funded by sales tax revenue. With this in mind, we are able to look at these numbers and get an idea of just how big of an impact those outside our community have on funding many of the City services we all enjoy. Harrisonville is grateful for the position we find ourselves in and we appreciate the importance and benefit of having a majority of our general fund services paid for by non-residents.

Lead Service Line Project —

pipes that bring water from the water main into your home or business.
